#### Details:

On Wednesday, February 11, 2015, at 9:00 AM, deputies working in the contract city of Eastvale, responded to the 14200 block of Schleisman Road, regarding an attempted carjacking. Deputies learned the victim was stopped at the intersection of Schleisman Road and Archibald Avenue waiting for the red signal light to change, when an unknown Hispanic male tried to forcefully gain entry into her vehicle. The victim was able to flee from the area without injury to herself or damage to her vehicle.

The suspect is described as:

- **Hispanic male adult, 30-40 years of age, tall, thin, with a dark complexion and a mustache. He was last seen wearing a baseball style cap, jeans and a camouflage jacket.**

### Did YOU Know? Temporary Exterior Displays and Holiday Display - CORRECTION

**Posted Date:** 2/8/2015 2:00 PM

Did you know that the City **Municipal Code Sec. 120.05.080.(c)(7)** - Neighborhood Preservation Standards - Temporary exterior display and holiday display provides enforceable guidelines:

- a. Any temporary exterior display or holiday display shall not physically impede vehicular or pedestrian traffic on any street, sidewalk or right-of-way;
- b. Any temporary exterior display or holiday display shall be allowed for a period not to exceed 45 consecutive days.

Eastvale Code Enforcement Officers will begin enforcement of Municipal Code Sec. 120.05.080.(c)(7) beginning on **Monday, February 9, 2015**. Residents are asked to come into compliance by removing your temporary exterior holiday displays. Homes that are not in compliance will receive a Notice of Non-Compliance with **fourteen (14) days to correct the violation**. 

### Street Sweeping Reminder

The City of Eastvale contracts through Waste Management with Dickson Street Sweeping for street sweeping services. This service ensures that all City-approved arterial, residential, industrial and alley roadways are kept clean. Maintaining clean streets keeps the City of Eastvale beautiful and complies with the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) and National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) requirements.



Street parking is prohibited during the days and times identified on the street sweeping sign(s) within the neighborhoods. The prohibited times and days for parking are identified on the signs which may vary per neighborhood. Vehicles parked on the street during those days and between the posted hours will be cited under section 10.20.040-Parking prohibited-street sweeping. The fine amount is \$50.00


### Temporary Signs in the Public Right of Way

**Posted Date:** 10/23/2014 1:30 PM

Citizens, business owners, non-profit organizations and others are asked to please abide by the rules and criteria outlined below when placing Garage Sale signs or other temporary signs within the City of Eastvale. Temporary Signs in the Public Right of Way is defined as any sign, including commercial, non-commercial or political sign displayed for a limited period of time.

1. **Temporary signs may be placed in the public right of way during the period beginning 4 p.m. Friday and ending 7 p.m. Sunday. Signs in place outside this period will be subject to removal.**
2. **Temporary Sign Size, Materials, and Maintenance Criteria.** All temporary signs placed in the right of way must:
  - a) Be free-standing and securely mounted on a wooden or metal stakes;
  - b) Be no higher than four (4) feet above grade;
  - c) Be no larger than six (6) square feet and no more than three (3) feet in either height or width;
  - d) Be constructed of substantial sturdy, durable and weather-proof material;
  - e) Be kept in good repair;
  - f) Be non-illuminated;
  - g) Include the contact name and phone number of the person responsible for the sign in a clearly legible manner, either on the front or back of the sign; and
  - h) Be located in a permitted location as defined in this Section 5.E. 3.
3. **Sign Location.** Temporary signs in the public right of way must be located at least 20 feet from the curved portion of the corner in order to maintain visibility for motorists, as shown in the illustration. In addition, the following apply:
  - a) Signs must be located at least two feet from the edge of a curb or sidewalk, or from the edge of the pavement if there is no curb or sidewalk.
  - b) Signs shall be installed so as not to damage plant materials, irrigation equipment or other public property.
  - c) Signs may not be placed on a sidewalk.
  - d) Signs may not be placed in a roadway median.
  - e) Signs may not be attached to utility poles, sign posts, fences, walls, or any other structure.

#### Details:

The Jurupa Valley Station-Eastvale Police Department will be conducting a DUI/Driver's License Checkpoint on January 30, 2015, at an undisclosed location within the city limits of Eastvale between the hours of 7:00 p.m. to 3:00 a.m.

The deterrent effect of DUI checkpoints is a proven resource in reducing the number of persons killed and injured in alcohol or drug involved crashes. Research shows that crashes involving an impaired driver can be reduced by up to 20 percent when well-publicized DUI checkpoints and proactive DUI patrols are conducted routinely.

In California, this deadly crime led to 802 deaths in 2012 because someone failed to designate a sober driver. Nationally, the latest data shows nearly 10,000 were killed by an impaired driver. "Driving while under the influence of an alcoholic beverage or drugs is a choice. When someone chooses to drive under the influence, they put themselves and the entire community at risk," said Sgt. Bill Davis.

Officers will be looking for signs of alcohol and/or drug impairment with officers checking drivers for proper licensing, delaying motorists only momentarily. When possible, specially trained officers will be available to evaluate those suspected of drug-impaired driving.

Recent statistics reveal that 30 percent of drivers in fatal crashes had one or more drugs in their systems. A study of active drivers showed more tested positive for drugs that may impair driving (14 percent) than did for alcohol (7.3 percent). Of the drugs, marijuana was most prevalent, at 7.4 percent, slightly more than alcohol.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), checkpoints have provided the most effective documented results of any of the DUI enforcement strategies, while also yielding considerable cost savings of \$6 for every \$1 spent. Nearly 90 percent of California drivers approve of DUI checkpoints.

DUI Checkpoints are placed in locations based on collision statistics and frequency of DUI arrests affording the greatest opportunity for achieving drunk and drugged driving deterrence. Locations are chosen with safety considerations for the officers and the public.

Drivers caught driving impaired can expect the impact of a DUI arrest to include jail time, fines, fees, DUI classes and other expenses that can exceed \$10,000, not to mention the embarrassment when friends and family find out.

Funding for this checkpoint is provided to the Eastvale Police Department by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, reminding everyone to "report drunk driver/call 911."

#### Update:

Eastvale, CA - Officers from the Eastvale Police Department scheduled a DUI checkpoint on January 30, 2015. Due to inclement weather, the checkpoint was canceled and officers conducted a DUI saturation patrol to stop and arrest alcohol and drug-impaired drivers in the Department's ongoing traffic safety campaign. The saturation patrol was conducted between the hours of 8:00 p.m. to 3:00 a.m. in areas with high frequencies of DUI collisions and/or arrests.

#### Operation Results:

- 77 vehicle stops were conducted
- 65 field sobriety tests were conducted
- 0 arrests for DUI
- 6 citations issued for suspended / unlicensed drivers
- 5 vehicles were towed for unlicensed / suspended drivers
- 44 citations were issued for miscellaneous traffic violations

After falling dramatically for five straight years, figures for 2012 show an increase to 802 deaths because someone failed to designate a sober driver. Over the course of the past three years in the City of Eastvale, DUI collisions have claimed approximately 4 lives and resulted in 210 injury crashes harming 230 of our friends and neighbors.

DUI can impact the economy in addition to the pain and suffering of those immediately affected. Conservatively, a fatality has a \$1.4 million impact, an injury \$70,000, and a crash that only damages property averages nearly \$9000.

If you're drinking and driving, law enforcement will find and arrest you. No warnings, no excuses. The only way to truly avoid a DUI is to drive sober. There are many ways to get home safely after drinking, and driving isn't one of them. Designate a sober driver ahead of time, or call a friend or family member.

You could also use public transportation or call a taxi. The cost of cab fare is nothing compared to a \$10,000 DUI or the cost of someone's life, and the 'inconvenience' of not driving your own car home is nothing compared to the inconvenience of spending time behind bars.





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### **BACKGROUND**

At the September 23, 2014 Public Safety Commission meeting, commissioners requested a list and description of potential violations around the school sites/zones. It was further suggested that the Corona-Norco Unified School District (CNUSD) and Riverside County Sheriff's Department work together to develop a flyer that could be distributed through the school sites as well as City Hall resources. This same idea was then expressed at a Quarterly Schools Meeting between City staff and CNUSD administrators.

### **DISCUSSION:**

The attached is a draft of a Bicycle, Pedestrian and Traffic Safety outreach and education flyer. Riverside County Sheriff's Department and CNUSD staff have been working collaboratively to develop a cross-branded brochure that will fit the needs of all the jurisdictions that CNUSD serves. Once the brochure is final, it will be distributed to the students, school sites and made available through city hall resources.

**Unattended Child in Vehicle:** A parent, legal guardian, or other person responsible for a child who is 6 years of age or younger may not leave that child inside a motor vehicle without being subject to the supervision of a person who is 12 years of age or older. **CVC 15620(a), 22516**



**Disabled Parking:** Unless a vehicle displays a disabled license plate or placard, you may not park in parking spaces designated for the disabled by blue lines or signs, nor in the cross-hatched area adjacent to them. **CVC 22507.8**



**No U-Turn Sign:** It is unlawful for a driver of a vehicle to fail to obey a sign or signal. **CVC 21461 (a)**



**No Parking Signs:** You may not stop or park your vehicle, whether occupied or not, except while actually engaged in loading or unloading merchandise or passengers. **CVC 463, 22505, 22506, 22507**



**Cell Phones:** A person shall not drive a motor vehicle while using a wireless telephone unless that telephone is specifically designed and configured to allow hands-free listening and talking, and is used in that manner while driving. **CVC 23123 (a)**



**Passing a Stopped School Bus:** When approaching a school bus, from either direction, that is stopped for the loading or unloading of school children, and which displays a flashing red light signal and stop signal arm, you must immediately stop and shall not proceed until the flashing red light and stop arm cease operation. **CVC 22454 (a)**



**U-Turn in Residential District:** You shall not make a U-Turn in a residential district when any other vehicle is approaching from either direction within 200 feet, except at an intersection when the approaching vehicle is controlled by an official traffic control device. **CVC 22103**

**Impeding Traffic:** You may not drive your vehicle upon a highway at a slow speed as to impede or block the normal and reasonable movement of traffic. Please do not unload your children from the traffic lane and allow them to walk between vehicles in motion. **CVC 22400 (a)**



**Double Parking / Unlawful Curb Parking:** You may not park on the street adjacent to another parked vehicle. Vehicles parked must be within 18" from the curb. **CVC 22500 (h), CVC 22502 (a)**

**Red Curbs:** No Stopping, standing, or parking, whether the vehicle is attended or unattended. **CVC 21458 (a) (1)**

This brochure was written in collaboration with the Riverside Sheriff's Department and the Corona Police Department to provide clarification on laws related to the operation of vehicles in school zones and provide basic bicycle and pedestrian safety tips.



## Bicycle Safety

### Safety Tips for Motorists

- Slow down near bicyclists.
- Pay attention and avoid driving distractions.
- Look for bicyclists before opening your car door.
- Be aware of oncoming bicyclists when making a left turn.
- Check your blind spot for bicyclists before turning right.
- Always maintain a distance of no less than 3 feet while passing a bicyclist.
- In the event you are involved in an accident on or near school grounds, contact administration and law enforcement.



### Safety Tips for Bicyclists

- Ride with the flow of traffic, not against it.
- Ride with a white front light at night.
- Be visible. Don't hug the curb and ride in a straight line.
- Stop at red lights and stop signs.
- Ride 3-5 feet to the left of parked cars to avoid opening doors.
- Always wear a helmet and never ride with headphones.
- Be predictable and use hand signals.
- Always secure your bike when not in use. The District is not responsible for the theft of personal property. **BP 5460**



## Tips to Pick Up and Drop Off Children at School

1. Seat belt ALL passengers.
2. Children 12 and under must ride in back seat.
3. Position your child so they exit curbside, away from traffic.
4. Plan enough time to account for traffic.
5. Familiarize yourself with school drop-off and pick-up practices and always follow them.
6. If the curb says "No stopping or parking at any time," that means for everyone. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**
7. Do not block crosswalks or fire zone areas.
8. Do not position your vehicle where you will have to back up after drop off.
9. Put your vehicle in **PARK** and use your **EMERGENCY BRAKE**.
10. Carpool when possible.
11. Refrain from using any electronic device when behind the wheel.
12. Discuss traffic rules with your child.
13. Take your child to the drop-off area and "practice" at an off-peak time.
14. Explain the purpose of crossing guards.
15. Teach children to use marked crosswalks (walk, never run).
16. Remind children to never enter the street from between parked cars.
17. Have children look left, look right, then look left again when crossing the street.



**Speed Limits:** The speed limit in school zones is 25 mph when children are present, unless the posted signs show lower speed. **CVC 22352 (a) (2) (B)**

**Fire Lanes:** You may not park or leave your vehicle standing, whether attended or unattended, in any location, public or private, that is designated as a fire lane. **CVC 22500.1**

**Jaywalking:** You may not walk in the middle of the street that has a traffic control signal at each adjacent intersection. **CVC 21954, 21955**

**Crossing Guards:** It is unlawful to disobey the traffic directions of a traffic guard. **CVC 2815**



**Crosswalks:** You may not stop or park blocking a marked crosswalk. Vehicles must yield right-of-way to pedestrians in a marked crosswalk or unmarked crosswalk at an intersection. **CVC 21970, 22500 (a) & (b), 21950**

**Fire Hydrants:** You may not park within 15 feet of a fire hydrant. **CVC 22514 (a)**



**Park or Parking:** "Park or parking" means the standing of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, other than temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading merchandise or passengers. **CVC 463**
